



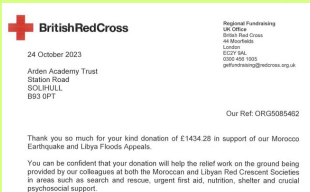
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Charitable Giving

Train to Teach in the Arden Alliance

You may or may not know that Arden is the lead school in a group of schools that work together to train new teachers and welcome them into our brilliant profession. We work with our partners to train primary and secondary school teachers in a wide range of subjects. The recent closer ties with Dorridge Primary, a primary lead school in its own right, has allowed us to amalgamate our teacher training efforts and further enhance the provision for all new teachers in our alliances.

We accept applications from those who have just graduated as well as those who are career changing later in life. It is particularly pleasing to see a number of former pupils from our family of schools training with us this year, or having applied to train next year. With bursaries for some subjects at £28,000 it is easy to see the appeal, especially to those former students who can convince their parents to once again allow them to stay at home for the training year; £28,000 is a good chunk of a house deposit!

He left Arden to go to UCB to study for a Level 3 in Professional Cookery, which eventually led him to work at Peel's Michelin-starred restaurant in Hampton Manor. During this time he also appeared on the BBC show Masterchef, reaching the knockout stages in 2019. He is currently working as sous chef at Whatley Manor in the Cotswolds. Monty gave the keynote speech of the evening about following your passions and the virtues of hard work.



The students from Year 13 were in Year 10 when the world of education was majorly disrupted by a global pandemic that changed normal life for the next two years. We were allowed back into school for most of the second year of their GCSEs, however, the resilience they had had to show was incredible. None of us know what the long term effects of all of this will be but the short term effects were plain to see and it is to their credit that they persevered and dug deep to still make educational progress. The results they achieved were absolutely fantastic with the best Average Point Score Arden Sixth Form has ever seen, and individually results that every one should be very proud of. Not everyone can get straight A*s, but everyone can be the best that they can be - this is a phrase that they all lived up to. They all continued their journeys in a wonderfully diverse way, with some continuing their education at University, and a great number starting work-based learning through the apprenticeship route. There were a few not able to be here on the night due to exciting gap year plans—the best excuse being representing Team GB in Sailing in Rio, Brazil—well done Oscar!!

For the year 11 class of 2023 the covid affected years came a bit earlier in their journey and will have undoubtedly affected their formative years in secondary education. The start of their KS4 journey was as “normal” as normal could be and they set about their business, laying foundations across many different combinations of GCSE and vocational qualifications. Whilst the outside world was rebuilding and re-establishing itself, these students had to get their heads into their books alongside all of the usual teenage life events. Most of us that were involved with them will remember their spark and zest for life, which we certainly saw in and around school. When the time came they got stuck in and we are thrilled with the set of results they achieved. Results that will massively help them in their next steps and futures.



There were 122 prizes given out on the night, so too many to mention individually. The prizes ranged from individual subject prizes to recognition of contributions to school music, performing arts and sport. Y7 Walsall art gallery trip

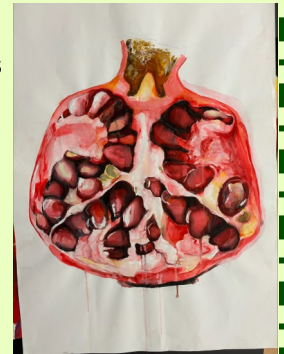

We are really pleased to report that Arden won 'Overall Best School Submission' in the college / sixth form category.



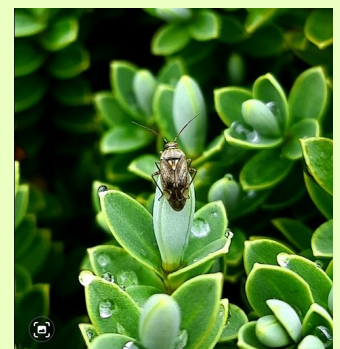
Harry Potter Careers Trip

Physicists Reach for the Stars at National Space Academy Workshop

On December 7th, a select group of Year 10 Physicists participated eagerly in a Space Workshop organized by the National Space Academy. The session began with students impressively calculating distances in our Solar System, and culminated in a hydrogen fuelled rocket challenge.

During the two-hour workshop, our budding scientists delved into the intricacies of rockets, asteroids, and meteors. They crafted their own hovercrafts and launched hydrogen rockets, with mini rockets zipping across the classroom. The winning team—Anna, Ruby, Sienna, and Zara—stood out for their technical prowess and collaborative spirit.

The students were excellent representatives of Arden and the community, asking insightful questions that showcased a deep understanding of the subject. Their exceptional enthusiasm and curiosity throughout the workshop was a joy to behold.

This National Space Academy experience not only broadened their horizons but also highlighted the promising future of scientific exploration within our school. As we celebrate their success, we anticipate further accomplishments from our Year 10 Physicists, using their Science learning as a launchpad for curiosity, knowledge, and achievement.

Psychology Conference

Our psychology students recently had the exceptional opportunity to attend an enriching conference on November 30th, featuring esteemed speakers who delved into various facets of psychology.

The event commenced with an engaging presentation by Dr. Sophia Frangou, exploring the fascinating topic of how the brain undergoes transformative changes throughout development. Her insights provided a comprehensive understanding of the intricate processes that shape cognitive functions from childhood to adulthood. It was also really helpful to revise concepts we have been studying from the biopsychology module, extending our thinking in some areas.

Following this, Dr. Gaia Scerif shared her expertise on cognitive development in children, emphasizing the pivotal role early experiences play in shaping cognitive abilities. Her research shed light on the profound impact these insights can have on fostering healthier development in our youngest minds. This talk gave students the opportunity to broaden their understanding of cognition and development as this is not a topic we currently choose on the current AQA specification.

Blanca Piera Pi-Sunyer, a PhD student from the University of Cambridge, then took the stage to delve into the complexities of social and self-development during adolescence. Her research provided valuable insights into the challenges and triumphs of this critical period in human development. She also gave the students an opportunity to participate in future research, which fits in nicely with the practical lessons we undertake fortnightly.

Additionally, our students gained perspectives from a specialist speech and language therapist, offering practical insights into the intersection of language and psychological well-being. This dynamic field left our students with a deeper appreciation for the role of language in shaping our understanding of the mind.

Closing the conference on a high note, we were honored to have Dr. Arjune Sen, a distinguished consultant epileptologist, share clinical insights into mind-brain health. Dr. Sen's expertise not only provided a bridge between theoretical knowledge and practical applications but also offered a unique perspective on the intersection of psychology and neurological health. His valuable contributions enriched our students' understanding of the real-world implications of their studies in clinical settings.

This conference was a significant enrichment opportunity for our students, allowing them to engage with leading experts and broaden their perspectives in the field of psychology. The conference was pitched at a high level and offered an insight into how psychology is studied and practiced at a University. During the conference they conducted themselves impeccably and asked pertinent questions, demonstrating their maturity and readiness for their next stages.

Economics Professor visit

On Friday 24th November, the Year 13 Economics group had a double lesson provided by Prof Caroline Elliott from Warwick University. The aim of the session was to provide students with a better understanding of what they could potentially learn by studying the subject at university. She gave them a lesson on game theory, looking at how economic agents react and make decisions based upon both their preferred choices and those of others. She explained the theory to the class of Nash equilibria and dominant choices before asking the class to create their own games to test their understanding.

Prof Elliott also provided the Business and Economics department with free Business Review and Economics Review magazines, the latter of which she is a contributory author to.

Harrison Sargeant & Lucas Marcroft (Y13 Economics students) wrote:

Caroline was very clearly an expert in her field, yet her introduction to game theory broke it down into its core concepts and principles so effectively that even non-economic students could comprehend it. Her presentation had a multitude of examples for us to apply our learning and the interactive nature made the lecture even more exciting, particularly the real world application and origins of the game theory. As well, the opportunity to ask questions at the end allowed us to divulge and take further the theory we had been taught.

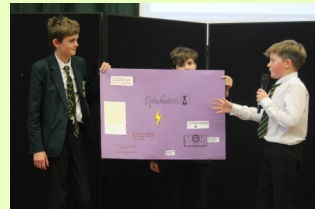
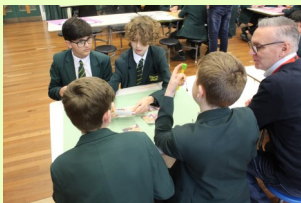
Pupils started the day by working in their chosen groups, exploring the ongoing issues and identifying the causes and consequences of each issue.

The next stage of the day involved each group discussing a range of issues that they are passionate about and deciding which one issue they are going to move forward with to create a solution to the issue. Working in their groups, pupils then started to come up with their company name and logo along with imaginative and creative ideas to solve the ongoing issue, the solution could be a product, campaign, or service.

At both stages of the day, groups were chosen to present their findings back to the rest of the pupils, which to a hall of 87 other pupils can be quite overwhelming but they all did a fantastic job.

All pupils were amazing throughout the day and it was fantastic to see their passion and dedication to solving a range of issues. Each group tackled their issue in a completely different way and came up with 24 different solutions. They were all a credit to Arden and should be very proud of what they achieved.

Pupils will now attend development sessions to help improve their solutions, ready to be entered into the local stages of a competition in March and hopefully progress further into the competition giving them the opportunity to present at Aston University for the regional stages.

A Literary Windfall for Arden Academy's Library

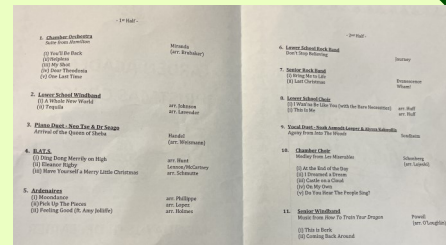

Despite their best efforts, they missed the deadline to submit their final answers and consequently missed out on the opportunity to progress to the national final.

While the disappointment of falling short in the final round may linger momentarily, the Arden students remain resilient and optimistic. With a wealth of experience gained from the Britannica Quiz, they view this setback as a valuable learning opportunity. The team is already gearing up for future challenges, vowing to hone their time-keeping skills and strategize more effectively in future quizzes.

PTFA Update

It's been a busy start to the year for the PTFA, with our Fireworks Festival and Christmas Ball both taking place in this term. As always, the support from everyone both in and outside school is phenomenal and has meant we've raised almost £15,000 from both events!

Our Pre-Loved uniform sale is ongoing via our dedicated Facebook page. This has been running for just over 2 years and to date we've raised over £3500. Committee meetings are held monthly on a Monday at 7.30pm at school. Dates are already published for 2024, and everyone is welcome, so why not come along and find out what we're all about. There is always a member of the SLT who can update on the latest happenings in school and as well as organising our fantastic fundraising events, we also hear bids directly from staff. These bids and their success determine how we distribute the money we raise. This school year already we have distributed over £14,000 in bids to a variety of departments including PE, Maths, DT, Science, Arden Futures, Photography, Up Learn resources for a variety of A-Level subjects in addition to new table tennis tables for use by the whole school. We also fund one of the minibus leases annually at a cost of c. £7000.

This is all just a taster of what we do but hopefully it's provided some insight and more importantly, why, given the range of support that we directly fund to the school. It's more important than ever that we get new volunteers joining in - you can commit as much or as little as your time allows. 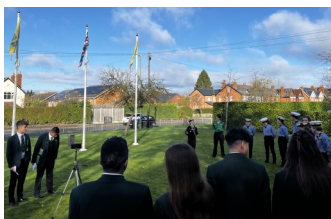
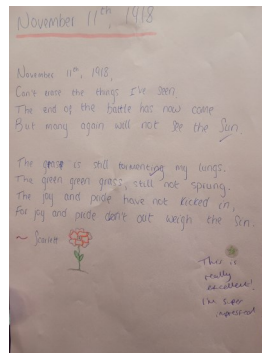
Arden Remembers
